

HOW TO DO BUSINESS WITH T-MOBILE

T-Mobile's procurement and supply chain teams manage the contractual relationships with suppliers across the enterprise. T-Mobile seeks to identify Business Unit suppliers capable of providing the best and most competitively sourced products and services. When contracting with T-Mobile, Business Units are expected to adhere to the following*:

- Diverse Suppliers must first be certified as a diverse or small business (Diverse Supplier) to support T-Mobile's diverse spend reporting.
- Several certifying agencies exist to certify a Diverse Supplier. T-Mobile recognizes the following:
 - National Minority Supplier Development Council (NMSDC)
 - Women's Business Enterprise National Council (WBENC)
 - National Gay and Lesbian Chamber of Commerce (NGLCC)
 - National Veteran Business Development Council (NVBDC)
 - Disability:IN
 - www.<u>SAM.gov</u>
 - <u>www.thesupplierclearinghouse</u> (for those providing services in California)
- Diverse Suppliers must create a profile by registering with T-Mobile for consideration of RFx opportunities (i.e., Request for "x" (x = Information, Quote, Proposal) by registering at the T-Mobile Diverse Supplier Registration Site (SupplierOne). If a supplier is not sure or needs to confirm registration, go to SupplierOne, which allows searching of registered Diverse Suppliers. Companies not listed are not recognized as a T-Mobile registered Diverse Supplier.
- Certification information must remain accurate and current (e.g., diversity certifications, accurate email addresses, phone numbers, mailing addresses, and line(s) of business).

• Minimum Requirements

- Be in business for at least 12 months.
- Have more than two W-2 full time employees.
- Must not exclusively obtain revenue directly from T-Mobile.
- Meet insurance requirements for general/commercial liability, cyber/e-commerce, fidelity, errors & omissions, and inherent risk. Requirements may vary by type/size of service/product purchased by T-Mobile.
- Meet T-Mobile's safety requirements, as required, by the type of service/product.
- Meet T-Mobile's bonding requirements (typically, payment bonds are required for construction services or services where subcontractors will be used).
- Be capable of receiving purchase orders, issuing invoices, and receiving payments electronically via the T-Mobile specified tool, and meet contractual requirements.
- Supplier must not be on the U.S. Treasury Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) SDN List (Specially Designated Nationals and Blocked persons) of banned organizations, companies, or individuals.
- Supplier must agree to adhere to the <u>T-Mobile Code of Supplier Conduct</u>.
- Staffing companies can email their company profile to Debra.Sullivan@Tapfin.com.

Guidance

- Use effective marketing strategies to distinguish your company from others.
- Patience: Understand contracts are cyclical and opportunities may not be readily available. Ask when the approximate next cycle for RFx will occur.
 - Diverse Suppliers may request feedback, every three to six months, regarding status of the next RFx opportunity.
- Upon suppliers taking required actions, identified herein, and providing Supplier Diversity representative(s) a capability statement, Supplier Diversity will champion the supplier's company by introducing them to a Procurement or Business Unit representative.
- Should T-Mobile Procurement or a Business Unit representative want to learn more regarding the Diverse Supplier's company, Supplier Diversity will host a call, or the Procurement Manager/Business Unit representative may directly contact the supplier.
- Supplier Diversity is the liaison between Procurement and Diverse Suppliers. Supplier Diversity does not manage RFx or contract awards.
- Supplier Diversity team will proactively inform CBOs of supplier opportunities when made aware of them; please engage with your local council or chamber to check for opportunities.
